### Initial Assessment and Identification

Timelines	Potential EL students flagged for EL screening through the state's Home Language Survey must be assessed for EL identification within thirty (30) days of enrollment. Potential EL students that register after the beginning of the school year must be assessed within two weeks of enrollment. (Found in <u>Delivering Education Services to English Learners: Policies and Procedures for Administrators, Instructional Leaders, and Teachers in the District of Columbia.)</u> Within 30 days of the start of the school year, or within 30 days of placement if not identified at the beginning of the school year, the LEA must notify parents that their child was identified as being eligible for EL services.
Home Language Survey	<ul> <li>The state's Home Language Survey is completed once, at the time of initial enrollment in a DC public or public charter school.</li> <li>If the Home Language Survey indicates a language other than English is spoken in the home, then further assessments must be conducted to determine the student's English Language proficiency level</li> <li>The state's Home Language Survey is available in English and seven other languages.</li> <li>Additional information on Alternate Screener participation criteria will be available by August 1<sup>st</sup></li> </ul>

Paper Based Screener Costs	LEAs are responsible for purchasing paper screener assessments if they choose to administer WIDA Screener Paper For more information, go to the <u>WIDA Store</u> . Identification/Placement Criteria	<b>Exit Criteria:</b> Additional information will be available by August 1 <sup>st</sup> Kindergarten: Composite PL of 5.0 or higher on the annual ACCESS assessment.
	Grades 1-12: Overall composite PL of 4.5 or higher on the annual ACCESS assessment.
	Alternate: Additional information will be available by August 1 <sup>st</sup>
	Identification Criteria: Additional information will be available by August 1 <sup>st</sup>
	Kindergarten, first semester (listening and speaking only)
	In Kindergarten, first semester, students will take listening and speaking only. Students who receive an <u>oral</u> composite score of <b>less than 5.0</b> will qualify for EL services.
	Kindergarten, second semester (all four domains)
	In Kindergarten, second semester, students will take all four domains. Students who receive an <b>overall</b> composite score of <b>less than 5.0</b> will qualify for EL services.
	Grades 1 – 12:
	Students who receive a composite proficiency level score less than 5.0 will qualify for EL services.

EL Services or Program Requirements	LEAs must provide an instructional language assistance or bilingual program to students who are identified as ELs. The chosen program model must be recognized as effective and sound by experts, and services should meet individual student needs. Additionally, the LEA or school must determine who will provide services, when services will be rendered, and how often services will be provided. In all program models, the LEA must ensure that ELs are held to the same high standards as all students.
	Services can begin after identification. The LEA must issue parent notification letter, however, non-return (by parents) does not prevent LEA from rendering services.

Declining Services	If services are refused, LEAs should work directly with the parents to ensure they understand the purpose of the service. If the parent(s) understands the service, yet still prefers to opt-out, then the refusal of services must be documented in writing.
	An English learner who is 'opted out' of all EL programs and services must be monitored regularly to ensure academic progress, be provided adequate support to reduce any language barriers, and participate in the annual ACCESS assessment until meeting the exit protocol requirements. After meeting the exit protocol requirements, the student who has 'opted out' is formally exited and is monitored for four years.
