This document contains guidance on the identification and placement process for newly arrived English learners in your state. WIDA and your state education agency have worked together to provide this outline of policies, procedures, assessment options, test administrator training requirements, and criteria for placement in EL services. This document is updated each spring and throughout the year per SEA request.

Process Overview	 Administer a Home Language Survey (HLS) to students when they enter the district. Students identified as potential English Leaners (ELs) by the HLS should be screened within 30 days of enrollment in the district. The screening results determine the student's EL status (see page 3). 	
	 Students identified as EL must be placed in EL services immediately. Within 30 days after the beginning of the school year or 14 days after enrollment in a TBE/TPI program, parents/guardians must be notified of placement. 	
	 The notification describes the program placement, services, exit, and parent rights, including option for refusal. Update State Student Information System All students who were initially screened in preschool must be screened again upon entering Kindergarten. Current ELs in Kindergarten to Grade 12 should not be re-screened. 	

Timelines	Notification letters of program placement to parents/guardians must be sent no later than 30 days after the beginning of each school year. When a student is identified as EL after the start of the school year, the districts must send a notification letter to the students' parents/guardians within 14 days of the program enrollment date. Districts must notify parents/guardians every year in which EL students participate in an EL program. The communication must always include the screener or ACCESS scores and the program placement.
Home Language Survey	Every public school shall administer a Home Language Survey (HLS) to all new students enrolling in the district for the first time. The HLS should be included as part of the enrollment packet for every student. The HLS is available in numerous languages on ISBE's <u>Identification & Screening page</u> under "Home Language Surveys." Districts that elect to create their own HLS should ensure that it includes at least the following questions: • Is a language other than English spoken at home, and if so, which language? • Does the student speak a language other than English, and if so, which language? The student shall be identified as a potential EL if the answer to either question is "yes." If the student is a potential EL, the district must screen the student for English language proficiency. The HLS should be administered in the student's home language or a language that the parents comprehend. The Home Language Survey form shall provide spaces for the date and the signature of the student's parent or legal guardian. Additional information is available on the <u>ISBE website</u> .

Other Useful Resources or Information	Screening Preschool-Age Children Prescribed Screening Instrument(s): Illinois does not endorse a specific commercial screening tool for potential ELs in preschool from ages 3-5, but lists some vendors on their Identification and Placement webpage. Using Scores to Determine Placement: Districts should use the guidance included in the commercial vendor's training documents for the purpose of placing students. All potential ELs screened with the commercial screening tool need to be re-screened with the WIDA Screener for Kindergarten upon entering Kindergarten.

Each assessment/screener requires specific trainings.

Test Administrator Training and Certification

However, individuals that meet ALL of the criteria listed below may administer ACCESS for ELLs, WIDA Screener, WIDA Screener for Kindergarten, or preschool screener.

- The individual has been hired by the district on a long-term substitute basis to fill in for a teacher who is out on extended leave due to illness, maternity leave, or any such leave officially approved by the employing district, and
- The individual's assigned duties must include all duties customarily performed by the regular teacher such as lesson planning, other state mandated test administration and report card generation, and
- The individual must hold a license for the grade level (a Professional Educator License (PEL) or an Educator License with Stipulations (ELS)) and meet state assignment requirements, and
- The individual must complete the required training and meet certification requirements for the instrument to be administered (ACCESS for ELLs, WIDA Screener, WIDA Screener for Kindergarten, or preschool screener).

Can paraprofessionals administer ACCESS, WIDA Screener, WIDA Screener for Kindergarten, and/or preschool screener? Paraprofessionals who *only* hold paraprofessional credentials cannot administer ACCESS for ELLs, WIDA Screener, WIDA Screener for Kindergarten, or preschool screener.

However, individuals that meet ALL of the criteria listed below may administer ACCESS for ELLs, WIDA Screener, WIDA Screener for Kindergarten, or preschool screener.

- The individual has been hired by the district as a paraprofessional, and
- The individual must hold a current teaching license for the grade level (a Professional Educator License (PEL) or an Educator License with Stipulations (ELS) and meet state assignment requirements, and
- The individual must complete the required training and meet certification requirements for the instrument to be administered (ACCESS for ELLs, WIDA Screener, WIDA Screener for Kindergarten, or preschool screener).

EL Program Requirements – Services & Support

Question/Topic	State-specific Guidance
EL Services or Program Requirements	All ELs in Illinois need to be placed into either a Transitional Bilingual Education (TBE) Program or a Transitional Program of Instruction (TPI). There is no minimum requirement of hours for EL services and support.
	EL screening results, in addition to EL status, program type, instructional design and periods of service are to be uploaded to the State Student Information System.
Declining Services	To refuse language support services, parents must provide the district with a signed, written statement that they are refusing services. However, this parental statement does not relinquish the district from its obligation to provide a meaningful education to the student and to continue to annually assess the student's language proficiency with the ACCESS for ELLs. The district should communicate the ACCESS results and program options to the parents on an annual basis. If the parent does not indicate a change in services, the refusal remains active.
