**Student B to Student A:** One reason Galileo wanted to know more about space, um, is because he want, um, everyone to know the truth about space and be the first person to learn the truth about, um, space and the moon and everything. And, um, another reason is people believed, um, in something, but they believed in, um, things that were false. And also . . .
